

The Monitoring Student Improvement Achievement Targets document (p.8) indicates that we either met or exceeded virtually all stated targets. This is particularly impressive, considering that we experienced the global pandemic during the final three years of the planning cycle.

In the second half of 2022, a thorough review was conducted in the lead-up to the new School Business Plan 2023-25 (Overview p.6). MONITORING STUDENT IMPROVEMENT ACHIEVEMENT TARGETS

Student achievement targets were developed as a component of the School Business Plan 2018-2022 to focus on specific areas where improvement was desired. Targets were established based on the existing achievement data as well as a comparison with "Like Schools". The targets were intended to be aspirational, but also achievable, based on students' potential.

Supporting each target, there is a linked strategy (or a number of strategies) and resources designed to ensure a particular focus on improvement in that area. The targets were monitored at least twice a year by the school leadership group and the School Board. They were also monitored by the relevant Learning Areas.

The nine target areas contain eighteen assessments. It is pleasing to see that twelve of the eighteen assessments were fully achieved by the end of 2022; two were not applicable in 2022; and three were almost fully achieved. The greatest success has been achieved in the targets relating to literacy performance and WACE performance.

The Tennis achievement targets were introduced for the first time to a Business Plan, and their benchmarks may have been set too high.

NB: 2023 will see the implementation of a new School Business Plan and a new set of achievement targets to support this.


Despite the challenges posed by a wave of COVID-19 infections in Western Australia during Term 2, the vast majority of Year 7 and 9 students were able to complete their NAPLAN tests in 2022. These students missed NAPLAN testing in 2020 due to the COVID pandemic, so it was the first time they had completed NAPLAN in four years. This was the second year our students completed NAPLAN Online on their own devices. Their organisation, engagement and average test scores were outstanding and compared favourably with Like Schools.








Students at Applecross Senior High School performed above the expected standard for our school in all of the National Assessment Plan – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests.

Throughout 2022, targeted programs were used to support students in achieving the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA). The number of students who demonstrated the required standard of Literacy and Numeracy for the WACE continues to exceed that of our Like Schools.

As a result of our focus on Literacy, including the prevention and intervention strategies we have implemented, our students have continued to demonstrate excellent achievement.



YEAR 12 RESULTS

The overall performance of Year 12 students in 2022 was outstanding and consolidated the program of improvement that has been occurring for the last seven years. Students performed well in all three pathways (ATAR, VET and General). The Median ATAR of 91.20 was the highest recorded in the school's history.

In 2022, Applecross SHS Year 12 students performed above expected levels in the WACE exams. This is a Department of Education measure based on performance compared with the Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage (ICSEA). This is the eighth year that this performance indicator has been in the positive or at the expected level.



Performing Arts - Drama

- Despite the threat of COVID-19 cancellation, the Year 12 Production of Shakespeare's As You
 Like It was performed in Term 1. This was an interesting opportunity for bringing The Bard's
 work to the Applecross community, with Year 12 students acting, designing and directing the
 show, and involved some Year 11 students also stepping into roles
- The Senior School Drama students bravely performed solo pieces and Original Solo Productions to a small audience for A Night of Monologues
- The Year 11 Drama students presented an intense Australian play, When the Rain Stops Falling, by Andrew Bovell. Despite the numerous setbacks during rehearsal, the show was received well
- Some of the Year 8 Drama students were involved in performing a puppet show to visiting Year 1 students from Ardross Primary School. The performance involved students creating their own puppets and backdrop and developing the performance of The Rainbow Fish
- The Year 10 Drama students presented Children of the Black Skirt by Angela Betzien. This
 was a challenging Australian production that involved students acting and designing the

Performing Arts - Music

- Music Department performances throughout the year included the three major Music
 Department Concerts in May, September and November, featuring over 250 students across
 our eight ensembles. On a more intimate scale, students performed solos and small group
 items at PARAGON (the Term 3 upper school Music showcase), the annual Art Exhibition in
 Term 4, and at school awards assemblies throughout the year
- Music Department ensembles achieved high rankings from the adjudicators at the state-wide Term 3 festivals, including Cygnet String Orchestra, Concert Band 2, Choir, Jazz Band, Junior Guitar Ensemble and Senior Guitar Ensemble



English

- Year 12 WACE results in English and Literature were outstanding, showing a stark improvement
 of 2021 results and significantly better than like schools. English was nearly 10% higher than the
 State's mean.
- The School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) identified Applecross as one of the schools having the highest-performing students in ATAR English and Literature.
- All students who gained Certificates of Distinction or Merit from SCSA passed ATAR English or Literature.
- English contributes to the Curtin UniReady program, offering units in Fundamentals of Academic Writing and Communications. This initiative gave 38 students to opportunity to acquire an ATAR of 70 that they would not otherwise have had.
- In Years 7 and 8, 374 students exceeded the course standards by earning an A or B grade. In Years 9 and 10, 349 students received an A or B grade. This means around 60% of our students exceed the expected West Australian Curriculum standard.
- Students in Years 7-10 competed in the annual Book in a Day competition, raising money for the Kids Cancer Project. This year we had more participants than ever before, fielding six teams who each wrote a novella in 12 hours.
- First prize was awarded to Emmey Levar-Uppill, Year 9, in the Years 7-9 division in the prestigious Tim Winton Award for Young Writers Competition for her short story "Nobody Has to Know".
- Year 12 Literature students attended a Black Swan Theatre Company's production of "The Glass Menagerie" at His Majesty's Theatre, which supported their study of Tennessee Williams plays.
- Excellent NAPLAN results were achieved in Years 7 and 9, with their organisation, engagement, and average test scores being outstanding and compared favourably with like schools.
- Targeted strategies were implemented in the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessments (OLNA) to ensure that more of our students achieved the standards required for WACE than like schools.
- Although cut short by COVID-19, Applecross fielded eight teams for debating in Years 7 10.
 Each team was prepared and mentored by English teachers, who also adjudicated debates run after school hours.
- In Term 4, Year 7 students trialled "Renaissance Reader", a program designed to increase reading for pleasure. This will be rolled out in Year 7 in 2023.

Health and Physical Education

 Applecross SHS competed in many Interschool competitions this year with many students achieving high results across the board. With the reinvigorated extra-curricular schedule, Volleyball and Badminton continued to build in popularity, allowing students to enter tournaments they had previously missed.

Applecross students excelled, achieving significantly above the State and Australian average in all year levels and categories. We had multiple students achieve in the top 1% of their year group. Congratulations to Maisie Kidd, Erika Wee and Matyas Zmitko in Year 7, Nathan Bird in Year 9 and Rose Tomlinson in Year 10 for this fantastic achievement
- Students in the HaSS Academic Extension program for Years 7-10 were also given the
 opportunity to participate in the Australian History Competition. Congratulations to Nathan Bird
 in Year 9 for achieving in the top 1% for all of Australia and to Jamie Wright, in Year 10, who was
 named as joint WA state champion for the Australian History Competition, competing against
 over 32,000 students Australia-wide
- Ruby Allen, Lincoln Duckett and Jaya Dean reached the interview stage for the 2023 Premier's ANZAC Tour after submitting fantastic written pieces about how the Home Front was just as important as the battles fought overseas
- The Year 10 HaSS Academic Extension class were responsible for planning and delivering an ANZAC service in recognition of those who have gone before us
- All Year 7 students participated in the Bricks4Kids incursion, gaining an understanding of Ancient Roman, Greek and Egyptian architecture and inventions through the use of Lego
- The Year 8 AE and ACC participated in a visit to the Perth Museum Boola Bardip to participate in a Managing Country workshop followed by a walking tour of Northbridge to investigate the causes and impacts of immigration in Australia



LEARNING AREA HIGHLIGHTS

Languages

Students of French and Japanese languages enjoyed a variety of activities this year, both in and outside the classroom.

French

- The Year 11 students have enjoyed reading French books from the French library set-up. The library offered different types of books (comic books, short stories, novels) of different genres. The aim was to promote French and encourage students to read more
- Throughout the year, students from all year levels participated in food activities, which highlighted the cultural aspects of units of study in each semester. Activities included the béret game, the Fromton activity, bringing French food to class, dress up day, tasting French pastries (dégustation) from L'Opéra Café and making pretzels
- The Year 12s celebrated their hard work at the famous French restaurant 'Chez Pierre'. The
 excursion allowed the students to order their food in French, enjoy gourmet French food,
 socialise with their teachers and Native Speaker Tutors and enjoy the art of socialisation in
 the French culture
- Preparations started for our visit from French students at Le lycée de la Sainte-Famille in Amiens in October 2023. They will be with us for two weeks and hosted by families from our school. Our guests will be attending classes with their host, as well as participating in various activities. We are delighted to be able to host these students next year

Japanese

- Year 10 students took part in our first ever 'Japanese Roadshow', which took place over three days. Students went on a two-day excursion to Hyogo Cultural Centre. They participated in various cultural activities, such as making their own Obento and taking part in a tea ceremony. On the third day, students spent the day at school interacting online with our exchange partner, Takarazuka students
- Guest Speaker and Kaiwa Day Excursion for Year 12 Students we invited a guest speaker to
 our school, Ms Sue, to provide the Year 12 students with some valuable exam tips. Students
 also participated in a Kaiwa Day excursion on 3 September to prepare for the Practical and
 Written Mock and WACE examinations. Year 12 students obtained useful hints and practised
 their conversation skills with experienced examiners
- Year 12 students went to the Tansawa Japanese Restaurant to celebrate their hard work and achievements in Japanese. Students and the Japanese teachers enjoyed eating a beautiful Japanese dinner together
- Year 11 students interacted with Seiryo Senior High School twice online. Year 10 students interacted with students in Takarazuka, and Year 9 students interacted with Naruo Senior High School in November. Students introduced themselves, prepared a few questions to ask the Japanese students, and responded to the questions in English and Japanese
- We resumed welcoming Japanese exchange students from Murdoch University to join our speaking practice sessions. Year 11 and 12 students were fortunate to have this opportunity to talk to similar aged native Japanese speakers every week
- Japan Club ran various Japanese cultural activities for students to experience every Wednesday at lunchtime, such as calligraphy. Students practiced well and entered the JLTAWA Calligraphy competition in September
- Students in all year levels enjoyed cultural in-class activities throughout the year

Mathematics

- Our results in the 2022 ATAR examinations are to be commended. Our students showed through their results that they were thoroughly prepared to complete their final papers, and their efforts were outstanding
- Special mention must be made to two students in particular:
 - Jaehyun Kwon for his award of a Special Subject Certificate of Excellence in Mathematics Specialist, achieving the highest final examination score in the State
 - Sylvia Diep for being awarded the Subject Certificate of Excellence for Mathematics Applications, which meant she finished in the top 0.5% of the State
- Mathematics Applications students are to be congratulated on their performances. They achieved a mean score of 74.5% on the written examination, 14% above the State mean
- Mathematics Methods candidates also gained a higher mean score than the State, with a larger cohort of students studying the subject than in previous years
- The Mathematics Specialist students are to be commended on their final results again, much higher than the State mean
- With delays due to COVID-19, our students showed their grit and were still in high spirits being able to tackle many national and international competitions once again
 - Australian Engineering Award for 2022 Three Year 12 students (Jackie Lau, Elton Ong, and Jaehyun Kwon) won the prestigious Australian Engineering Award for 2022. They are students who have received an A grade for each of Mathematics Methods, Mathematics Specialist, Chemistry and Physics in Year 11 and Year 12
 - Year 7-12 Computational and Algorithmic Thinking Competition This competition incorporates unique three-stage tasks that encourage students to develop informal algorithms and apply them to test data of increasing size or complexity. Thus, it helps identify students' computer programming potential—something they might not usually have the opportunity to demonstrate. It also encourages students to solve real-world problems, and the process helps students become more confident as they take on interesting new challenges. Thus, it is the most challenging competition held by the Mathematics Learning Area. This year 84 out of 168 students were awarded Credit or higher awards, with Year 9 Noel Liu taking the High Distinction Award
 - Year 7-12 Australian Mathematics Competition Another exceptional result this year in this
 annual competition, with 165 out of 182 participants receiving Credit for higher awards! Year
 12 Jaehyun Kwon (Best in School), Year 10 Jordan Hassan and James Wright, and Year 8 Alex
 Sanchez were the High Distinction Award winners. There were also 76 Distinction and 85
 Credit award winners
 - Year 7-12 Have Sum Fun Face to Face Our Senior Team (Years 11 and 12) scored 29 out of 32 and finished sixth in the competition
 - Year 7-10 Have Sum Fun Online Two Year 10 teams were placed in fourth and sixth places, and one Year 9 team was second with 3 out of 3 perfect scores
 - Year 7-8 Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiad This was the first year the Senior division was completed by Years 7 and 8 only as the new regulation by the Mathematical Association of WA. Year 7 gave it their best shot, and six were top 25%. Year 8 had ten students achieve the Top 10%, and 19 students achieve the Top 25%. The standout competitors were Year 7 Maisie Kidd and Year 8 Jude Burleigh

LEARNING AREA HIGHLIGHTS

Science

- This year we have again had to manage the effects of COVID-19, which made teaching, learning
 and assessing an interesting challenge for all. Having lessons available on both OneNote and
 SEQTA has made life easier for everyone and ensured that students were able to access the
 learning from home if necessary
- The ACER testing has continued to show that our students are significantly ahead of their peers compared to the norm-referenced standardised national data sample
- We continue to embed indigenous perspectives into our teaching programs and are working on developing culturally sensitive materials for lesson delivery. Once again, we had the Aboriginal Cultural Incursion for Year 7 students delivered by Derek Nannup, which was an enriching and enjoyable experience for all
- The Year 10 AE class attended the Science and Engineering Challenge competing against fellow Year 10s from schools across the state. The challenge presented by Rotary International requires students to use their problem solving and teamwork skills to overcome specific issues within the STEM field and focus on sustainability and innovation. Our students were awarded third place on the day
- We continue to foster strong relationships with local Primary Schools by hosting Year 5 and 6 students for Super Science in Semesters One and Two. The students enjoy a range of activities showcasing skills in Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Psychology
- Although we had many cancellations due to COVID-19, we also had some new activities this
 year:
 - Our Year 8 students competed in the Biokemon Challenge sponsored by Murdoch University. This activity introduces them to the world of ecology. One thousand five hundred students were participating across 20 schools in metropolitan and regional areas. We had two individual prize winners from our extension class, and they each received a \$50 JB Hi-Fi voucher
 - Miss Kim's Year 7 Science class visited the WA Wildlife Hospital. The students followed the
 journey of a wildlife patient from admission through to triage, treatment, radiology, and
 surgery, then into the various recovery wards, including Isolation, Birds, Seabirds, Mammals
 and Reptiles
 - Some of our Year 10 students attended Murdoch University's Seek Out Science Day. Students participated in hands-on lab activities focused on Forensic Science, Nursing and Marine Biology. Students also got some wonderful insight into university life and the types of career pathways available to them
 - Year 8 excursion to Perth Mint and WA museum in Term 4. Students had the opportunity to extend their understanding of geology, minerals and the mining industry in WA

This year we were also excited to have one of our teaching staff, Miss Kim, interviewed by ABC about our prosthetics hand project. This project is undertaken by Year 7 AE students, and we have been lucky enough to be helped by an ex-student, Max Prinz, who works as an Orthotist designing and fitting braces and splints for people with disabilities or injuries




Technologies

Design & Technology / Digital Technologies / Home Economics

- **Design and Technology.** Lower School courses All Systems Go and Concept to Reality proved popular and captured students within specifically designed STEM environments. Delivering tasks associated with engineering principles and by incorporating CAD and laser cutting technologies, we challenged our students to design and fabricate boat hulls, wobble walkers, bubble-blowing machines, hovercrafts, and dragsters. In doing so, they unconsciously developed soft skills, including critical thinking, problem-solving, teamwork and adaptability
- Design and Technology introduced a new Certificate II course, Construction Pathways. This
 Year 11 option replaced the long-standing Automotive offerings and with great success for the
 inaugural year. Year 11s focused on the brick-and-block laying context, including critical core
 elements of WHS and Measurements and Calculations. In working with Brick and Block Careers,
 the department successfully sourced product support from Midland Brick, who kindly donated
 multiple packs of bricks for student use. They have further supported the school in preparation
 for 2023, delivering additional brick packs in December. Construction numbers look extremely
 promising, with at least six classes timetabled between Years 10-12 for 2023
- **Digital Technologies.** Available for 2022 was our first Technologies ATAR course, Applied Information and Technology. This course was offered alongside an SCSA General option. For 2023, many students have selected Year 11 ATAR AIT, proving the popularity of the content and course. Digital Technologies continued its success with its evening Film Festival. The event featured short films of diverse genres and messages developed by students in Years 9 and 10. Furthermore, excursions to Escape Hunt again were successful and focused on STEM skills!!
- Home Economics. Home Economics is transitioning the sewing room from D to S Block. In 2022, we were able to timetable two Year 8 sewing classes into S Block to trial the new classroom. It was satisfactory, and with further changes for storage and minor furniture improvements ahead, we look forward to accommodating Years 8-10 classes next year. In addition, twenty-four new sewing machines were purchased, combined with the new classroom, which will make for a great sewing space. This year there were 21 sewing classes taught in Years 8-10, or approximately 400+ students
- **Red Apple Café.** The Hospitality teachers and students had great success in the daily running of the Red Apple Café, serving teachers and Year 12s at recess. Applecross staff highly supported the café, purchasing coffee and morning tea. It also served as a communal point and networking space for staff. A PayPass machine added to the convenience and efficiency of the café. The Red Apple Café is always a venue to be visited on School Tours and helps promote Home Economics. Coffee vouchers are frequently awarded to staff by various committees/learning areas to recognise work and achievement, which aids in promoting the school's priority of wellbeing.
- Supporting Applecross and the Community. The Home Economics staff and students have supported the school in several community and charity events, including RUOK? Day, Wear It Purple Day, NAIDOC Week, and various catering events. Staff groups have also booked the Red Apple Café to host small group meetings. The highlight of 2023 was hosting Premier Mark McGowan and local MLA Kim Giddens in the Red Apple Café on the 25th of August. Hospitality staff and students met with the Premier, serving him coffee and our famous sausage rolls and lemon friands



GIFTED AND TALENTED VISUAL ARTS

Extension and Enrichment

Our GATE students engage in a comprehensive extension program through our Saturday workshops. Masterclasses and experiences in traditional art media, such as drawing, painting, printmaking and sculpture, sit alongside other contemporary and digital media workshops, such as wearable art, fashion and animation. These workshops, led by industry professionals, extend our students' skills, abilities and knowledge beyond the usual curriculum with outstanding results. Excellent performance is proven by the number of awards and competitions we have represented this year and achieved success. These include wins in St George's, City of Melville (Youth Winner, Youth Runner-Up, Popular Choice Award), extensive representation in the Young Originals exhibition and a total of six Year 12s selected for Pulse Perspectives 2023, amongst other accolades and achievements.

GATE students are dedicated, motivated and highly engaged in the GATE extension programme, particularly on Saturdays, where they are well supported by teachers, tutors and the GATE Parent Committee. The Annual Exhibition featured our largest fashion and wearable art collective to date. The show has grown to be a much-anticipated event showcasing a vast array of artworks and media. Over 400 people attended the opening night, and approximately 200 people patronised the exhibition across the weekend.

Selective Entry Process and Next Gen

Formal testing of aspiring Year 7 applicants continued to occur onsite this year, with over 200 applicants for Applecross SHS GATE Visual Arts programme. The testing process took place over a weekend in Term 1 and resulted in over 70 interviews for 36 positions offered. The process is gruelling for applicants and staff involved, who must set up tests, register and complete all the assessments quickly to deliver results back to the GATE Selection Unit. Many thanks go to the art staff who worked tirelessly over the weeks and weekends to ensure a smooth and thorough testing programme.

We welcomed our 2023 Next Gen at an Orientation Saturday in Term 4 and on our general Year 7 Orientation Days. The current Year 7s proved to be very welcoming and willing buddies for the day.

Young Masters Program

Amongst other community outreach and liaison, the GATE program offers a three day course for Year 5s to attend. The course features photography, illustration, painting and printmaking projects linked by the theme "Kambarang", the indigenous season. Many colourful works were created, and we successfully advocated for the Visual Arts programme through these workshops. We expect to

- To finish a great year, we had our annual Tennis Program Presentation evening, where we acknowledged all our success in 2022 and presented various awards






STUDENT SERVICES

Student resilience and wellbeing are essential for both academic and social development, and this is optimised by the provision of safe, supportive, and respectful learning environments.



Student Attendance at Applecross Senior High School continues to be above our 'Like' schools and the State. Our 'Regular Attendance' category is comprised of students who have an attendance rate of above 90% throughout the year.

Despite COVID-19 impacting attendance again in 2022, our school has maintained an overall attendance rate of 88.8% across the school. In recent years, there has been an increase in students being diagnosed with significant mental health issues requiring adjustments to their timetable during periods of time to ensure that they are able to maintain engagement and connectedness to the school.

Whilst we have students in the 'moderate' and 'severe' range of attendance due to hospitalisation, disengagement, we continue to remain above that of our 'Like' schools as a result of the targeted support strategies and interventions in place to effectively case manage all students based on their individual needs.

Our Student Services team is highly skilled in tracking the attendance thoroughly and following up on all absentees providing a support process for students and parents requiring additional assistance.



Student Place of Birth (number)




COMMUNITY SURVEYS

Our school uses a variety of survey tools to seek feedback from our parents, student and staff on a range of areas in an effort to constantly improve our ability to best cater for our students. The school's Executive Leaders and School Board analyse the results. When areas of concern are identified, we seek further input to develop 'lines of enquiry' to look for opportunities for improvement.

The National Schools Community Survey is one of these tools. It is conducted every two years and includes questions which are the same for all Australian schools. In 2022 we had 115 staff, 271 parents, and 928 students respond to the voluntary survey. The number of respondents is lower than previous years which we believe to be a result of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. In line with previous surveys our school has been rated very highly in all areas surveyed across all survey groups. A snapshot of responses is represented below.


Snapshot of Parent Responses

OUR STAFF






Cash Position


Current Year Actual Cash Sources


