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News

School Board Meeting Summary Study 2024

On behalf of the School Board, we extend a warm welcome to all our new and returning students and staff for 2024. The Board held their first meeting for 2024, in person, on Thursday, 22nd February. Our first Board meeting generally involves a full agenda, including finance updates for the beginning of the year; initial presentation of the draft 2023 Annual Report; and welcoming of our new Board members and our 2024 Student Council Representatives.

Associate Principal for Years 10-12, Ms Toni Jones, provided a detailed presentation of the 2023 Year 12 WACE Results, which highlighted the outstanding achievements of our 2023 Year 12 graduates. The school is to be congratulated on the fantastic results, which reflect a team effort in monitoring, tracking, and nurturing our students through their final years of high school. Some highlights include:

- 99.64% of year 12 students achieved WACE
- 8 Students achieved an ATAR 99+
- 43 students with an ATAR over 95
- 💋 169 students completed a VET Cert II or higher
- 64% of students achieved an ATAR of 90+

School Principal, Mr Paul Leech, provided updates on a number of areas, including the progress of the Annual Report, how the school has been coping during the recent heatwave, changes to staff, and other school matters. The Principal reported that it has been a strong start to 2024, with staff and students settling into the year well.

The Board heard from our Student Council, who informed us of the success of the Year 12 Ball, along with updates on planned events, future ideas and some general feedback.

In closing, the Chairperson highlighted the need to continue to work with local government and relevant authorities to gather the support needed to plan for future funding, growth and building expansion as our student numbers continue to grow.

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Year 7 and 9 NAPLAN

NAPLAN will take place from **Wednesday, 13th of March (Week 7) to Monday, 25th March (Week 9) 2024.** Catch-up tests will be available for students who are absent on test days up to and including Monday, the 25th of March.

NAPLAN online is the only test with an adaptive and tailored design. Initially, every student will start with a similar set of questions. Based on their response, the subsequent set of questions may get easier or more challenging, allowing for a greater opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and ability.



Students can access their test schedule now by checking their timetable on the SEQTA platform, which provides a clear overview of their upcoming test dates. These timetable changes will begin at the start of Period 4 on Tuesday, the 12th of March, and students must check their SEQTA timetable carefully because of the many room changes that are occurring for various classes.

All students should now have the **current NAP Locked Down Browser installed on their device**; if they don't, please visit the I.T. department in the library at school as soon as possible.

Please remember to bring your fully charged device to the test. You will also need your headphones (Bluetooth headphones are not permitted as they can cause connectivity issues). We will provide any other required materials.

Please ensure your child(ren) are using the Education Perfect program as a means of honing literacy skills. Additionally, encourage your child to visit the NAPLAN Online Public Demonstration Site to see the types of questions and related functionalities in the NAPLAN Online assessment.

Learning to Learn: Years 7-9


The Power of Revision

Effective learning requires the ongoing revision of class notes and new material. Research clearly indicates that spaced revision has a significant impact on what is remembered and, therefore, what can be applied. At Applecross Senior High School, we promote the 10:24:7 revisitation guideline (10 minutues, 24 hours, 7 days). The graph illustrates the impact these revisitations have on the percentage of information retained. It also illustrates how much is forgotten if the material or the day's learning is not revisited. Some of these revisitations will happen in class, but you can help by encouraging your child to revise at home.

How can I help my child to revise?

- 1. Ask to see your child's Interactive Notebook and ask them questions.
- 2. Ask them to tell you what they learned today or this week.
- 3. Ask them to teach you something.
- Work with them to make quiz cards or use a quizzing software program, like Quizzlet.

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Year 11 Students and Academic Results - Seeking Feedback

Year 11 students have hit the ground running and for some, the learning curve was much steeper than they imagined. With many courses having completed at least one assessment, students should reflect carefully on their results, take action through feedback from their classroom teacher and implement a strategy for improvement. As we have our Parent/ Teacher interviews early in Term 2, making an appointment with each teacher and your child will enable you to get accurate information on their current level of progress.

Sometimes, the pathway or individual courses selected are not suitable for particular students. If this is the case, I encourage you to have open conversations with your child and contact the classroom teacher to discuss their current level of achievement and seek strategies for improvement. Alternatively, or if there are bigger concerns across multiple courses, contact <u>Toni Jones</u> or <u>Ebony Morrison</u> to arrange a meeting with you and your child to discuss other more viable options.

TURN OFF DISTRACTION:

There are also several key strategies that students can implement to support their learning and consolidation of concepts during their study program:

- **Spaced Practice** (This means regular review of each course daily is best). Know when key assessments are on your calendar and plan for them in plenty of time.
- Active Recall writing everything out they have done in class without referring to notes. Complete past questions, teach a friend, and complete a mind map of concepts.
- Focus get started and remove distractions (phones, music, etc)
- **Syllabus Points** make sure you address the Syllabus points and tick them off when you are confident you know them and can apply them.

Completing an ATAR course is not everybody's story, and there are many alternative pathways to either university or other education and training options. Failing Year 11 is not an option; let us assist your child to achieve their Personal Best in their chosen pathway. Please do not hesitate to contact us to discuss options and support for your child.

These workshops are extremely valuable and have proven to be very popular amongst our students. Please encourage your child to make the most of these opportunities. These are heavily subsidised to make them affordable for all students.

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RAISE Mentoring Evaluation Report

We are pleased to partner with RAISE to assist our number one priority, Student Development and Wellbeing. RAISE has just released a preliminary copy of their 2023 Outcome and Economic Evaluation via Melbourne University. Please see some of the key points below.

They were able to support 2,744 young people across 200+ secondary schools Australia-wide. RAISE provided mentors to a range of Applecross SHS lower school students over a six-month period.

- Statistically significant improvement in all four mentee outcome areas: help-seeking, resilience, school engagement and hope for the future
- 97% of mentees enjoyed the program
- School belonging increased for 77% of mentees who needed it most
- 92% of parents were happy their child participated, and 86% saw improvement in their child because of mentoring
- 88% of schools said our program helped build collective and individual well-being in their school

Applecross SHS intends to run this program again in 2024, ensuring students feel well-connected and supported in their high school journey.

Congratulations to Miss Morrison and Mrs Casserly, the two student services managers involved with the program.

Homework

Place a Priority on Homework

There's no such thing as "no homework." During those times when there is no assignment from school due soon, your child can review their most difficult subjects via their Interactive Notebook or even do extra reading. Many experts agree on the following suggestions for how much homework children of different age levels should do:

Years 7-9 50 minutes to 2 hours per day

Years 10-12 1½ to 3 hours per day

When to Study

When should your child study? Any time is okay, as long as it's not too late at night. The ideal time is when they are usually most alert. This might be after school, after dinner or early in the morning. As you are setting the schedule, allow for plenty of break

school, after dinner or early in the morning. As you are setting the schedule, allow for plenty of breaks. For example, have your child work for 15 or 20 minutes and then take a five-minute break.

How to Study

There's no one best way to study. Some children need absolute peace so they can concentrate. Others can work with music playing in the background. There is **one thing on which all researchers agree**: *No one can study effectively with the TV on*. Eyes need to focus on what they're reading. Brains need to be paying attention to what's on the page—not what's on the screen. So when it's time to study, turn off the TV.

Here are a few more things you can do:

- **Protect your child's study time.** That means, in addition to no TV, no phone calls or texting, no visits from friends and no interruptions from you.
- **Modelling:** Work on your projects nearby as your child does homework. You can pay bills, write letters or read a book. You'll send a message to your child that you think homework time is important.
- Offer advice if your child needs help but resist the impulse to do their homework for them. It won't help them learn the material or help their teacher understand where they are having trouble.
- Challenge your child to a "Beat the Clock" game if they dawdle while doing homework. If they take an hour to complete an assignment, which their teacher says should only take 15 minutes, set the timer for 20 minutes. Challenge your child to finish before the timer goes off.

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
Year 10 Parent Information Evening: Pathways to Success

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
