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Letter From the School Board Chair - Capital Works

My name is Andrew Dwyer, Chair of the Applecross Senior High School (AXSHS) Board.

I wanted to share a topic that the Board has been discussing with you. In the 2023 Annual Report, I wrote that the Board recognises that the school is growing, and we are committed to supporting the school in efforts to secure the necessary resources to provide for future student and staff needs. School growth is a topic that your Board is united on and is acting proactively upon.

Our school has accommodated an additional 390 students since 2018 – plus teachers and support staff. The student growth is due to several factors, including:

- A strong economy and growth in local employment opportunities
- Overseas and interstate immigration following the COVID-19 pandemic
- Increased supply of housing in the catchment zone (both infill and higher density).
- Excellent WACE/ATAR results at AXSHS
- Outstanding academic and non-academic performance by the entire AXSHS community

For the broader community, this growth provides many positive opportunities we can all benefit from. For our school, it is likely that we will soon be beyond our physical capacity. Recently updated enrolment growth projections continue to underestimate actual enrolment trends and our building and facilities needs.

To date, our student enrolment increases have been mostly accommodated within existing facilities, which are now at or beyond the capacity originally planned. You may have noticed that the number of temporary demountable classrooms on site increases each year. More are planned for next year. These temporary measures are adequate for the short term but are not sustainable for the longer term. AXSHS is a physically constrained site, and challenges will arise without commitment to additional buildings and facilities. Temporary structures will continue to consume space, meaning less open space and less space for outside physical activity. Apart from classrooms, the single gymnasium is inadequate to cater for growing student numbers. The ongoing use of temporary accommodation will limit the space available to conduct the necessary building works - there will be no room for a building site compound, storage, and scheduling.

Over the past year, the school has hosted the Honourable Roger Cook MLA - Premier of Western Australia, the Hon Dr Tony Buti - Minister for Education; Aboriginal Affairs; Citizenship and Multicultural Interests, and Ms Kim Giddens MLA (Member for Bateman). At each interaction, the Board highlighted the increases in student enrolment and the school's efforts to accommodate the growth of students. On 30 May 2024, I wrote to the Premier and the Minister for Education to highlight the need for additional capital works funding and to discuss further.

As a Board, we are committed to excellence and the optimum development for all students – with a goal to encourage students to enjoy and value learning and achieve their potential. Increases in enrolment will continue, and an additional teaching block and facilities (such as a second gym) are required so that a growing student population can continue to receive the benefit of an AXSHS education. Now is the time for a strategic injection of funds for capital works to provide for the future, to support our students and staff, to keep AXSHS as a high-performing academic institution, and to continue our community impact.

We will continue to keep you informed of our efforts to progress this important matter.

School Board Meeting Summary

The meeting was held on the 13 of June. A presentation was provided by Fleur Cason (Special Art Coordinator) on the GATE Visual Art program, which included an outline of the classes that are held every Saturday. Ms Cason presented the outcomes and importance of having the Special art program and how it can lead to future creative and noncreative job prospects.

Other discussed topics included the increase in school emails and the management of student and parent expectations regarding after hours and holiday period communication. This issue is currently being discussed, and protocols are being developed. The Student Council presented their reports as they had just finished their Year 12 exams. Year 10s have just completed their course counselling sessions. In Week 11, there will be NAIDOC Week activities, including an Indigenous choir and a smoking ceremony.

There was a discussion on the nominations and criteria for the Board appreciation awards.

During the Board meetings, there have been multiple discussions on catering for future student enrolment increases by the school. It was agreed that a more detailed update would be provided within the next parent update.

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OLNA, Round Two, Term 3, Weeks 8 – 9

Some students in Years 10, 11, and 12 are due to sit the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA) during **Term 3, Weeks 8 and 9 from Monday, 2nd of September to Friday, 13th of September 2024**. The OLNA enables students to successfully demonstrate the minimum standards of literacy and numeracy required for the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE). The School Curriculum and Standards Authority awards the WACE at the end of Year 12 to students who have met all the requirements.



For students with a disability, we have guidelines to help determine the appropriate

adjustments. Students have two opportunities each year before the completion of Year 12 to meet the requirements. Once students have demonstrated the required skills in a component, they are not required to sit that component again. Students who wish to achieve a WACE and do not demonstrate the literacy and numeracy standard by the time they exit senior secondary schooling can apply to SCSA to re-sit the OLNA at any age.

The standard has three components – reading, writing and numeracy and requires students to demonstrate proficiency in using a range of skills in each component. The OLNA reading and numeracy components comprise of 45 multiple choice questions, whilst the writing component requires a comprehensive written response with a maximum limit of 600 words. Students are allowed 50 minutes for the reading and numeracy components and 60 minutes for the writing.

In preparation for the OLNA, it is recommended that students use their login and password details to access the OLNA Support Website at https://olna.com.au. Students who have previously completed the OLNA will have received a list of the skills and understandings they found challenging in the previous OLNA. They should take the time to develop these skills using the OLNA Support website. To guarantee the best chance of success, all students should complete the skill builders on the OLNA Support website weekly from now until the OLNA assessments. The OLNA Support website will provide students with the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the test format and enhance the students' proficiency in passing the OLNA.

May I remind all parents and guardians to continue checking **Connect** and support their child to liaise with classroom teachers throughout the semester for specific, detailed formative feedback, which may include:

- Verbal feedback directly to the student in class.
- Engagement with post-assessment reflection tasks identifying strengths and areas for improvement.
- Short quizzes, practice tests, entry/exit tickets.
- Reflection on Essential Questions and Success Criteria.
- Written feedback and annotations on students' completed work.
- Rubric-style feedback on a variety of assessments.





Spotlight on External Courses

A large variety of VET courses are available to students at South Metro and North Metro TAFEs, as well as private Training Organisations. All course information received to date has been posted in the Connect Library. The TAFEs have an online application process which is now open, and the application link is included with the TAFE information.

Students who are not in VET Connect are able to apply for a course which runs externally on one day per week through the P2C, provided that they meet the requirements to be given approval to miss school one day each week.

Students in a full ATAR pathway will not be able to undertake an external course. However, a student with **one ATAR** course can apply for the P2C to enrol in an external course if their ATAR course is not timetabled on the external training day.

It can be a life changing journey for students in a full cultural immersion – our students discovered the art, fashion, cuisine, architecture, warmth and hospitality of the Amiens people.

The hosting students will be coming to our school in October and preparations for this visit are underway. We are looking forward to welcoming our French Exchange students.

In September, 18 of our Japanese Language students are heading to Kyoto on our Japanese Exchange Program with Seiryo Senior High School. Students from this school visited us for a week in April and were hosted by some of our students. Preparations for an international exchange excursion take a lot of time and effort, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank both of our Exchange Program Coordinators, **Sumika Nishikawa and Charisma Valerie**, for all their hard work to make these events happen. The students who take part in these exchanges are provided the opportunity to not only use the language that they have been studying at school in different situations, but also learn about the history and culture of the countries they visit in a manner that cannot be done through a classroom environment.

- making crêpe batter and cooking it on a traditional crêpière
- creating a pretzel using playdough
- enjoying a cup of hot chocolate with a delicious madeleine or a palmier

Activities in class

Year 9 Marionette (puppet) making activities The year 9 students worked individually on creating their own marionettes. They then had to introduce the clothing items they learned in their French class. Sequins, plastic eyes, feathers, wood sticks, foam clothing items, foam hair and other materials were put into locked bags. Students created their marionette and really enjoyed the activity.
